***Rights at home:
The Scottish care home sector
and Self-directed Support.***

This report is based on recent research exploring the experience of the care home sector in Scotland in relation to Self-directed Support. The Report argues that there has been a failure to implement the policy for older people accessing nursing and residential care home provision, and that this is potentially an issue of equality and human rights.

Approaches to providing quality social care effectively to all who need it in an era of public expenditure constraints continues to be debated across Europe. In Scotland, one socially innovative policy approach to meeting the challenge of increased demands upon reducing resources has been a personal budgets system called Self-Directed-Support (SDS). As a result of the Social Care (Self-directed Support) (Scotland) Act 2013, SDS was implemented in Scotland from April 2014. Evidence since its implementation suggests that in some geographic areas, and for some demographic groups, SDS has been transformative. However, its success has been uneven, while its impact on local social care markets also varies widely across regions. Hence SDS is not without its critics, and there are issues which need to be addressed to ensure its universal success and end disparities in the lived experience of the policy. In an attempt to address such concerns, the Scottish Government have recently reinvigorated the policy. This round table aims to inform this reinvigoration process through collating insights from key stakeholders in order to generate a Briefing Paper on future directions in self-directed care in Scotland.
